SUMMARY

This dissertation explores older adults' civic engagement in relation to the places where they live. Civic engagement includes formal volunteering, political participation, informal help, associational membership and digital forms of engagement. Using an environmental and life-course approach, the dissertation examines how civic engagement unfolds across time and place, with a focus on older adults living in disadvantaged urban neighborhoods and those with migration backgrounds. As such, life-story interviews were conducted.

Results indicate that older adults' civic engagement in disadvantaged urban neighborhoods is shaped by particular social and physical neighborhood features. Furthermore, long-term residents speak about how neighborhood changes have reduced social networks. Yet, older adults also demonstrate agency, resilience and resistance through their civic engagement. Next to this, older migrant's life stories indicate that civic engagement does not only take place in neighborhoods, but it can be family-based or transnational as well. Overall, these findings suggest that civic engagement is dynamic and relational, that older adults contribute to their environments in diverse ways, and that we need to consider a plural notion of place, not only limited to neighborhoods, for fostering inclusive civic engagement in later life.
